

#### The Maricopa Community Colleges Have the Most Affordable Tuition Rates in Arizona

The Maricopa County Community College District (MCCCD), the largest community college system in the nation, is built on high quality — not high costs. The COVID-19 pandemic has changed our communities in unimaginable ways: In many cases, it has greatly impacted college plans due to concerns with being able to afford tuition. Tuition and fees for MCCCD classes (\$85 per credit hour and on an average annual cost of just over \$2,500 for full-time students) are considerably lower than those at other Arizona universities and private colleges.

To provide additional assistance, the Maricopa Community Colleges offer two new tuition discounts for Maricopa County residents and Out-of-State residents residing in Arizona.

Students with in-state residency status are eligible for a \$1,020 flat tuition rate. The flat rate applies when enrolling in 12.5 - 21 credits. Students with out-of-state residency status residing in Arizona are eligible for an \$85 per credit hour tuition rate.


## Second Year Foundation Earns Platinum Recognition

# 2021 CASE DISTRICT VII AWARDS of EXCELLENCE



## COVID-19 Fundraising Campaign Receives Gold Award

The Foundation was honored on February 5th at the 2021 CASE District VII Awards of Excellence virtual event. Our campaign, <u>Maricopa Community</u> <u>Colleges District Coming Together on Behalf of Our Students</u> was the recipient of a Gold Award for an entry in the Fundraising Pivot category. A total of 540 entries were submitted from 2 and 4 year colleges and universities in California, Nevada, Utah and Arizona. Only 166 were award winners. In March 2020, the Maricopa Community Colleges District shutdown immediately due to COVID-19, sending students, faculty and staff into a remote work and learning environment. All courses became virtual, leaving thousands of students without the technology they needed.

As the pandemic grew, basic needs became a huge problem for students. Wages were being lost due to reduced work hours or job loss, students were struggling to keep food on the table, utilities on, pay for housing and keep up with their studies. We knew this pandemic would also have a



detrimental effect on persistence and retention. As a result, the Foundation experienced an unprecedented increase of 11,141% in student emergency applications.

We instantly focused on supporting students and launched the first-ever cohesive communications effort, across all of the colleges. The effort focused on telling the story of students in need in hopes of inspiring employees, alumni, donors and others to help our students and our community in one of three areas: Emergency Funds, Food Pantry Funds and Greatest Needs Funds. A total of \$312,679.53 was raised, aiding 680 students.

Judy's scope of work has expanded significantly and as Chief Development Officer, she will be spearheading grants and the marketing and database analytics team, expanding the role of revenue management as the Foundation continues to position itself for success.

These announcements come as the Foundation undergoes a repositioning that includes Fiscal Director Diana-Aquirre-Rosales, who oversees accounting and finance, emergency funding, scholarships and donor relations. "These changes allow us to better focus upon such important areas as revenue generation, workforce development, planned giving, student emergency funding, more scholarship and program support aligning with our overall vision to improve lives through education," commented Spicker. He continued, "The past year has been filled with challenges that no one could have imagined, and I feel truly blessed for the partnerships the Foundation has with the Chancellor, District Leadership, College Presidents, Workforce Development, Resource Development Officers, faculty, staff as well as the Governing Board, Foundation Board, donors and the community overall. Looking to the future, I feel so grateful to have such a high performing Foundation team at my side, as we build a gold standard for the work that we do, ensuring a successful culture of philanthropy."



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
