## Construction Trades Graduate Takes McCarthy Building Companies Career Opportunity

South Mountain Community College (SMCC) graduate Kentrell Billups embarked on a new career with McCarthy Building Companies after completing a semester in the SMCC Construction Trades Institute.

Kentrell was part of the first inaugural cohort of those who received a Framing and Carpentry certificate from SMCC and took advantage of the guaranteed interviews offered by the program.

"My transition to McCarthy after attending the institute was pretty smooth," said Billups as he reflected on the career he chose and his new workplace. "A week before receiving our certificates, the companies actually came in to talk to us and to collect our information for recruitment," he added, as he talked about the commitment from partners such as McCarthy Building Companies, 3-G Construction, and Brewer.

Kentrell, a Marine Corps veteran, moved to Arizona in 2017. He initially enrolled at SMCC and other Maricopa Colleges, seeking a career in architecture. After the COVID-19 pandemic hit in early 2020, Kentrell and his wife sought new and faster educational options for him. They landed on the Construction Trades Institute opportunity so he could support their family. "I chose construction, specifically, carpentry because I saw construction as a constant; it was a career you can depend on," Billups said. "It was also a career that could give me opportunities to pursue architecture in the future."

Today, Kentrell is employed by McCarthy Building Companies. Kentrell feels he landed an opportunity to grow at a workplace where he can cross-train in various trades. "The type of work that I'm doing is fun, and I'm learning something new every day," said Billups. "Even my boss has mentioned knowing both sides of construction will help me in the long run if I pursue architecture."


## Mesa High School Graduates Apply Now For Mesa College Promise Funds

Mesa Mayor John Giles and Mesa Community College Interim President Lori M. Berquam, Ph.D., announce that the first Mesa College Promise eligible high school graduates will receive funding to attend MCC beginning with the fall 2021 semester. Each student accepted into the program will have their own academic advisor, a Promise orientation plus career and financial aid advising. Also, students receive all the free MCC services such as tutoring, parking, counseling, job skill assistance and the food pantry.

The Mesa College Promise is a commitment from the City of Mesa to residents that eligible graduating high school students, who reside in Mesa, may apply to attend MCC for two years with Arizona resident tuition and fees fully funded.

#### **Bank of America Philanthropy Benefits Indigenous MCC Students**

Indigenous Mesa Community College (MCC) students are beneficiaries of a generous \$150,000 grant from Bank of America awarded through the Maricopa Community Colleges Foundation as part of the bank's overall efforts to advance economic opportunity and racial equality. The grant makes emergency funding available to MCC students for the spring and fall 2021 semesters, allows for the development of Virtual Programming to inform and interact with students online, and provides educational stipends for university transfers.

"The economic needs in tribal communities continue to be a challenge that we, as a society, need to address," said Benito Almanza, Arizona president for Bank of America. "These challenges have been further exacerbated by the coronavirus, and there is an urgent need to invest in tribal education, as well as native-owned small businesses and health care - to help mitigate some of the enormous economic and health risks these communities currently face and open doors to greater racial equality and economic opportunity."

Many indigenous students are still reeling from job loss in their family, death and illness of loved ones and social unrest. To help, \$60,000 is dedicated to providing emergency funding to support up to 120 students (\$500 each per semester). Funds may be used for necessities such as food, transportation, technology needs and textbooks.

Marina J. Notah, a Navajo tribal member, received support to complete this semester. "Upon receiving the news that I was receiving support, I was ecstatic because it meant that my internet bill would be covered for the rest of the semester. I am one step closer to becoming a marine biologist."

## Bachelor's Degrees at Community Colleges

Arizona joins 23 other states that allow community colleges to offer baccalaureate degrees.

### MCCCD To Develop Baccalaureate Degree Programs In Workforce Areas

Earlier this month, Dr. Steven R. Gonzales, Interim Chancellor of the Maricopa County Community College District (MCCCD) on behalf of our Governing Board, faculty, and students, celebrates Arizona Governor Doug Ducey's signing of Senate Bill 1453. The bill allows community colleges to offer four-year baccalaureate degrees in an effort to further enhance students' access, opportunity, and affordability to higher education in Arizona, marking a historic moment for Arizona's families.

"Our motivation to offer baccalaureate degrees is to better support the needs of the skilled workforce in the highest demand areas of our state in a way that is equitable, accessible, and affordable for students," said Dr. Gonzales. "This is a historic moment for higher education in Arizona, and in the coming days I will bring together the colleges and faculty to determine which programs we will advance immediately for consideration as a four-year baccalaureate program. I thank Governor Ducey for keeping Arizona's students top of mind and signing Senate Bill 1453."

Before this legislation, the Maricopa Community Colleges have only offered twoyear degree programs and professional certifications. With this bill, Arizona will join 23 other states across the nation that allow community colleges to offer baccalaureate degrees under limited prescribed circumstances.

"This has been a priority our Governing Board has been working toward for 25 years, and we are thrilled to work with our faculty and many others in offering quality programs that better serve our students and develop a skilled workforce," said Marie Sullivan, President of the MCCCD Governing Board. "Community colleges serve a large number of first-generation college students, minority students, and students from lower socioeconomic backgrounds, and it is these students who will benefit most from baccalaureate degree programs at community colleges and who drove our commitment to this legislation."
