

# Advancing Entrepreneurship



Foundation Awarded \$1M Grant from Wells Fargo in Support of Advancing Entrepreneurship

The Maricopa Community Colleges Foundation (MCCF) has received a \$1M grant from Wells Fargo in support of Advancing Entrepreneurship at the Maricopa

County Community College District (MCCCD). The grant was announced by Wells Fargo CEO, Charlie Scharf, at a roundtable discussion held October 22, 2021, themed around small business growth and recovery efforts, attended by various community organizations and leaders including Arizona Governor, Doug Ducey.

The Advancing Entrepreneurship grant is focused on uplifting economically disadvantaged and diverseowned small businesses, as well as students of color pursuing business and entrepreneurial studies at the Maricopa Community Colleges. It provides scholarships and programming support to increase college enrollment and completion rates as well as provide funding to support business incubators, bootcamps, workshops and student pitch competitions.

In partnership with the Maricopa Workforce and Economic Development office, more than 1,200 small businesses and 230 of MCCCD students will benefit as a result of the grant which will also provide economically disadvantaged and diverse-owned small businesses access to capital and services, confidential counseling by SBA certified "Arizona Access to Capital" advisors, and opportunities allowing them to achieve digital transformation through the AZSBDC "LevelUp AZ Small Business" program.

# PepsiCo Grant Provides Scholarship Opportunities to Black and Hispanic Students

PepsiCo and its philanthropic arm, The PepsiCo Foundation, announced a \$500,000 2-year grant award to the Maricopa Community Colleges Foundation (MCCF). The grant is part of the PepsiCo Foundation Community College Program to provide scholarship opportunities for Black and Hispanic students across the country. The Maricopa Community Colleges District (MCCCD) is one of 13 community college systems in the country to be added to this growing scholarship program.

"This grant specifically aims to help reduce barriers that so many of our MCCCD students face in completing their higher education aspirations," said Brian F. Spicker, MCCF President and CEO. "In addition to scholarships, the PepsiCo Foundation Uplift Scholarship Program helps to close the wealth gap by providing access to higher education that will enable our students to acquire jobs in high growth career paths."

The PepsiCo Foundation Uplift Scholarship program focuses on Black and Hispanic students enrolled in Associates degrees or professional certificate programs relating to careers within the Food Systems Industries, including Marketing & Sales, Advanced Manufacturing, Logistics, Information Technology, Cybersecurity, and others.

Approximately 1400 scholarship recipients nationwide will receive financial assistance to remove historical barriers to enrollment,

persistence, and graduation, by the end of 2022. Scholars receive tuition assistance, eligible living expenses such as childcare and transportation, plus

exclusive enrichment opportunities including PepsiCo career exploration, facility tours, job shadowing, and access to career preparation tools such as virtual workshops, resume writing, interview skills, and more.

The timing of the grant is particularly critical for the economic recovery of low income Black and Hispanic students, the leading demographic for college stop outs and drop outs during the pandemic.

#### **Grant Supports Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Engagement**

We are is pleased to announce that we have received a \$500,000 grant from Bank of America in support of the Guided Pathways program at the Maricopa County Community College District (MCCCD).

Guided Pathways, a MCCCD program implemented to increase students' success in degree and certification completion by providing a structured educational model, will utilize the funds from Bank of America to advance success in the area of education to industry, focusing on closing the wage gap among minorities with improved outcomes for students of color, low income and

first-generation students. The concentration will be on career attainment in the fields of Information Technology, Cybersecurity, Business, Healthcare and Advanced Manufacturing.

"This partnership will bring to scale critical services and programs designed to increase student success and pathways to employment that not only helps students directly, but in the longer-term, strengthens our local economy," said Benito Almanza, President, Bank of America Arizona. "Our investment in Guided Pathways is a direct demonstration of how Bank of America works with our partners to create better social and economic outcomes in the communities we serve."

**Microsoft Assists Scholars Pursuing IT Sector Careers** 

On Thursday, October 21st, representatives from Microsoft's workforce development team, Bob Reitinger and Anthony Putorek, made a visit to the Microsoft Data Center Academy located on the Estrella Mountain Community College (EMCC) campus. The Data Center is available to students at EMCC or Glendale Community College pursuing an information technology related certification or degree. During their visit, Microsoft presented the Foundation with a check for \$60,000 for students who apply to become a Microsoft Data Center Scholar. Reitenger and Putorek also spent time meeting with several of the scholarship recipients and Data Center faculty and staff during their visit.

The Microsoft Datacenter Academy is a workforce development program from Microsoft Datacenter Community Development team. Through this program, Microsoft works with education partners in datacenter communities to deliver training and certifications to enable employment in the growing cloud computing and IT sectors.

# Impacting STEM Education And Workforce Needs



#### **APS Foundation Grant Supports STEM Outreach Programs**

The Arizona Public Service Foundation awarded a \$75,000 grant to the Maricopa Community Colleges Foundation to support science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) programs at Mesa Community College, Chandler-Gilbert Community College, Estrella Mountain Community College and Phoenix College. The largest portion of the grant, \$35,000, benefits STEM-focused, mentored,

work-based experiences for underrepresented STEM students at Phoenix College; \$17,200 supports the annual Girls Get It! conference sponsored by Mesa Community College, and \$22,800 supports the Hermanas program at Estrella Mountain Community College and Chandler-Gilbert Community College.

This year Girls Get IT! is slated for Nov. 19 at Scottsdale Community College and is open to 150 female 9th-12th grade students within the Mesa Public Schools and 60 professional women from various industries around the Valley. Nine breakout sessions will cover gaming, nanotechnology, networking/AI, cybersecurity and more. Keynote speaker is Fredi Lajvardi, program manager for the Marine Science Magnet program at Carl Hayden High School, where he leads the Falcon Robotics Team, an extracurricular STEM program that has received national and worldwide attention.

Participants explore a full range of educational and professional opportunities available for women in IT and make connections by engaging with other girls and young women interested in studying or already working in the field of IT.

"Women are vastly underrepresented in terms of STEM education and careers," said Diane Meza, Director of the Maricopa Information Technology Institute-East Valley (MITI-EV), which sponsors the event. "We're working to address the community's educational attainment and workforce development."

#### Volunteer Scholarship Reviewers Play Critical Role in Helping Students Acheive Educational Dreams

This year, more than 700 volunteers assisted in reviewing scholarship applications from students across the entire Maricopa Community Colleges District. Many volunteers participate individually and some become involved as part of their workplace or community organization.



"The Foundation received 8,361 scholarship applications last year," said Karley Mellberg, Scholarship and Donation Relations Manager, Maricopa Community Colleges Foundation. "The need for volunteers has never been more critical and we are extremely grateful to everyone who commits each year to help our students."

One such volunteer is Randon Wilkins, Manager, SRP Residential Call Center, who volunteers through the SRP VOLUNTEERS program which provided the Foundation with a team of 30 employees who reviewed more than 600 applications last year. "What made this opportunity rewarding was the fact that

each applicant had a different story and experience that brought them to this point and that they're inspired to improve their lives through education," Randon said. Randon understands how overwhelming paying for higher education can be. He continued, "Tuition can definitely be daunting. "I'm a first-generation graduate like many of the applicants, so it is exciting for me to see them go after their goals and learn about their family's history. I have so much hope for all of them."
